

NO TRACE FOUND OF YOUNG MAN LOST AT WACO FISHING PARTY

Hundred Dollar Reward Offered by Father, Dead or Alive—Lad Been Missing Since Wednesday Night—Three Boys at Liberty Five Hundred Dollar Bond—Another in Jail.

WACO, April 12.—No trace has been found today of Claude Glenn, 18 year old son of R. J. Glenn, residing near Lorena, missing since Wednesday, for whose recovery, dead or alive, the boy's father is offering a \$100 reward. Bill and Trice Hardy and Fritz Litcher are at liberty under \$500 bond and Lee Sage is in jail at Marlin on charges of technical assault with intent to kill, in connection with the disappearance of Glenn.

Mr. Glenn told his story to The News-Tribune Sunday. He was accompanied to Waco in a fruitless search by an older son, Robert Glenn.

Unshaven, with long drooping moustache, and just a glint of a tear scintillating through the large hornrimmed spectacles hiding much more, he recounted the incidents.

"Papa, do you reckon we can work any today?" Those were the last words he heard from his 18-year-old son.

"I don't know son, that depends," the father said.

And the son went off down the road to Hunt's store at Golinda, where he said he would play croquet with the boys and young men in the community who met there when the rains were too hard to do the early spring work.

Persuaded to Go Fishing.

Tice Hardy, friend of Claude, wanted to go fishing and asked Claude to go with him, according to reports given the father. The boy argued that the Wednesday morning was too cold. Persuasive efforts induced him and the two went off together to get Bill, brother of Tice. Bill Hardy works for Lee Sage. Then they all called for Fritz Litcher and together they went to Horseshoe Bend on the Brazos.

Horseshoe Bend is noted for its tragedies. Drownings have been numerous there and in the immediate vicinity, where the boiling waters of a rising Brazos eddy and swirl. Not long ago a boy and his girl friend were lost as an end to a swimming party.

The four set their throw lines, and in the evening kindled a fire in a small slough between two dense thickets. The slough runs down to the water's edge, and there is a sheer drop of six feet to the dark water below. The bushes also extend to the river bank.

As the quartet gathered around the fire a terrifying yell was heard up the stream. Someone is said to have yelled "wild man!"

There are several stories concerning the remaining details. One member of the group says that the boy, becoming frightened at the yell and its interpretation, jumped up from his seat beside the fire and ran aimlessly around it and back along the edge of the thicket to the high land. Another says that he ran through the thicket.

"But a man couldn't run through that thicket," the father said, and failed in an attempt to smile in describing the affair.

The other tale is that the boy ran straight for the water's edge, jumped off into the waters of the Brazos—and that's all.
